January 2026

Julian Gee – The Life and Times of a 20th Century Maverick

This talk introduces a unique character, Noel Pemberton-Billing. In his packed 67 years, he was (amongst other things) a prolific inventor, pioneer aviator, aircraft designer, politician, playwright, author, actor, gun-runner and spy—it's a true-life story you simply couldn't make up.

Julian is a cruise ship speaker who is now making presentations to local groups in return for a donation to the Romsey Cancer Support Centre where he is a trustee.

February 2026

Stephen Robson – The Old Dragon Who Spread His Wings – Nevil Shute – Aviation and Author Genius

Following on from January, this talk introduces us to yet another unique character.

Stretcher bearer, engineer, pilot, author, cofounder of Airspeed, sailor, model engineer, and racing driver are all in Shute's life experience. In his engineering life he was Nevil Norway, but as Nevil Shute he is known around the world.

We met Stephen during the visit to Bournemouth Aviation Museum in August, where he is a volunteer, and he is also the speaker secretary at Boscombe and Southbourne Probus Club.

So the preferred method is to use a stand alone PC, tablet, laptop, or an i pad.



CLUB MEETING 1ST JULY 2025,

The speaker at the meeting was Lieutenant Colonel (retd) James Porter who gave an illustrated talk entitled "The German occupation of the Channel Islands"

The Islands are self governing under the authority of The Duke of Normandy, who is the British Sovereign, currently King Charles III. The Islands have never been officially incorporated into England.

After war was declared in September 1939 life on the islands continued as normal for the period of "The Phony War" even tourism continued. But on the 10th May1940 Germany attacked France through the poorly fortified Ardenne and within six weeks France surrendered.

It was clear the Channel Islands could not be defended and on the 15th June the British Garrison was evacuated and the islands declared demilitarised though by accident or design this was not communicated to the Germans and on 28th June a German bombing raid took place, after which the BBC announced the Islands were an "Open Town".

When it was clear all was lost the islanders were given the opportunity to be evacuated to England. 17,000 left from Guernsey, including 5000 children, 6000 from Jersey including 1000 children and 2000 from Alderney.

Germany had not prioritised the invasion of the islands due to their limited military value and on 30th June a lone Luftwaffe aircraft landed at the airport and having found everything peaceful it was followed by a Junkers Trimotor carrying a platoon of Luftwaffe Infantry. They were met by the local Police Inspector and so began the occupation. The German Commander was Dr Lanz who behaved in a proper manner and the local administration was allowed to continue, including the courts though specific German edicts had to be incorporated and four new German Courts were set up.

Some limited resistance did take place Guernsey Underground News Service, "GUNS" was established, only to be betrayed by an Irish resident. Agriculture continued and fishing was allowed up to 1 mile from the coast and 2 miles escorted. However by September 1944 food supplies were running low and Britain had to supply food or evacuate the population, In the event the Red Cross provided emergency supplies.

The surrender by Germany of the islands was delayed until 9th May 1945 so the islands are the only UK territory to celebrate VE Day on 9th May.

That's it for this year, it only remains for me to wish everyone a very happy Christmas and a prosperous, and peaceful New Year.
