Kathy then took us on a very interesting meander back through time in what must be one of the world's oldest professions. Nick entertainingly went through the 7 popular theories of the time as to what happened, from alcohol induced mutiny to possible insurance fraud gone wrong.

Jon Symonds gave a most interesting talk in October on The Wireless in Wartime. The mere fact we all knew what a wireless was speaks volumes for our ages.
